Geopolitical Flashpoints: The Macroeconomic Impact of the Geostrategic Landscape

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## **Key Points:**

- Peace in Ukraine
  - o Instability in Ukraine is significant to US interests
    - The ongoing conflict in Ukraine receives limited media attention in the US
    - Russia invaded Europe from the south
  - o The February 2014 revolution replaced pro-Russia President, Yanukovych
    - Poroshenko was elected President in June 2014 and Ukraine restored its original constitution
  - After the revolution, Putin annexed Crimea
    - Russia's use of force was "elegant" utilizing special operation and clandestine capabilities
  - o Ukraine is better off remaining neutral, acting as a bridge between the East and West
    - It would not be an advantage to Ukraine to join NATO
  - Russia is most comfortable when kicking up problems in its near abroad, distracting from internal issues
    - Russia sees NATO expansion from 12 to 29 members as a threat and its international actions reflect this fear
  - o The annexation of Crimea is a violation of international law
  - o Russia's oil and gas exports are a key economic issue for Ukraine
  - O US military support to Ukraine is a means to an end, helping establish a free and stable Ukraine, that can then act as a neutral broker between Russia and Europe

# LIBOR vs. SOFR:

- The Fed clearly doesn't want LIBOR to be the benchmark rate
  - Expect more deals to be linked to SOFR
  - o This is the first real threat to LIBOR
- Investors are currently paying a premium as this new system develops
